# Introduction to Digital Nomadism

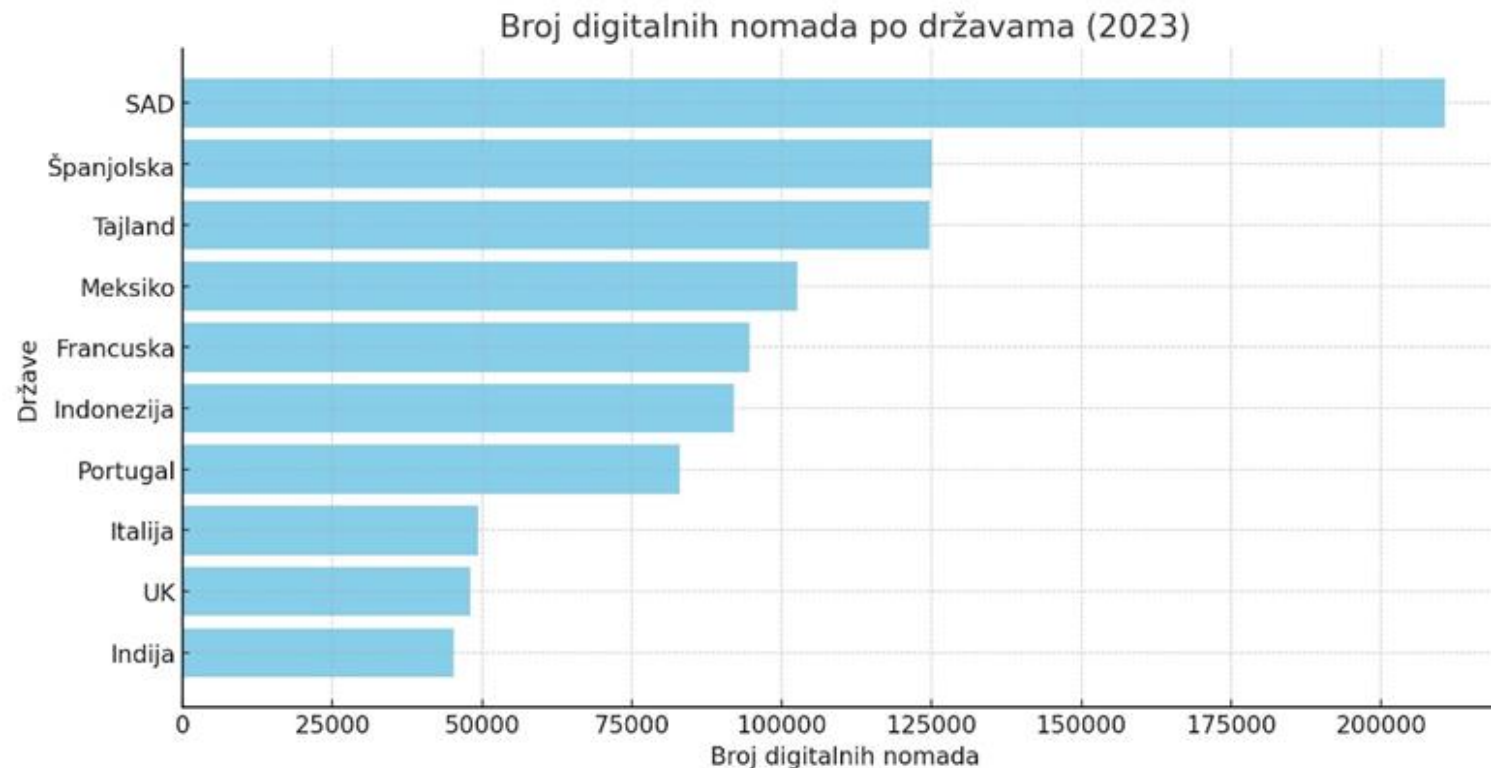
The growth of digital nomadism has been driven by technological advancements, enabling easy connectivity with employers and clients worldwide.
